Richard Blum is Chair of American Himalavan Foundation. It builds schools, plants trees, funds hospitals and cares for children and elderly in the Himalayas. But for his day job he's a Thieving Bastard.

Blum made millions of dollars from Irag and Afghanistan defense contracts through his company Perini. He holds investments in companies selling medical supplies to the Department of Veteran Affairs. Blum holds 111,000 shares of stock in dustry norms. URS Corporation, which is now the top defense contractor in the United States. URS was hired by UC Regents in 2005 to provide "program management services" for the development of a \$200 million Southeast Cam-

Integrated project at CAL. pus On July 15th the UC Board of Regents voted 11-1 to require its employees take unpaid days off to offset cuts in State funding. The Regent who voted against this was NOT Blum.

Blum's wife, Senator Dianne Feinstein, introduced legislation to route \$25 billion in taxpayer money to a government agency that had just awarded Blum's real estate firm a lucrative contract to sell foreclosed properties at compensation rates higher than in-

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# facts **EDITORIAL** We can Fight & We Can Win **Learning from Canadian Sisters & Brothers**

On November 6th, as part of the Canadian Federation of Students' National Day of Action Against Poverty, the Ontario Coalition Against Poverty (OCAP) organized a March into the Financial District of Toronto. Building on the growing anger at the trillions of dollars spent worldwide to rescue banks and financial institutions, while jobless rates soar, tuition fees go up, and governments at all levels viciously cut welfare entitlements. education, health care and all public services, OCAP was not content to simply rally and point fingers at politicians. Chanting "The Banks Got Bailed Out - We Got Sold Out", hundreds of welfare recipients, students, workers and activists from community organizations across the city and beyond, left a downtown park to march into Bay Street, Canada's Wall Street.

People were inspired when 5 members ran into an elite private Conservative club, forced open windows and denounced the bankers and politicians who have stolen billions of dollars from us. The spirit of resistance grew as the march continued to the tall towers of finance that frame the corridors of power of the capitalist thieves, here in Canada.

#### direct action

After dropping a huge banner from atop the Bank of Montreal, proclaiming CAPITALISM IS BROKEN, the march proceeded up the street to burn a large effigy of the Federal Minister of Finance. Along the way OCAP stopped to give support to

Communication and Energy Workers who have been locked out and to the electrical workers in Mexico who are union busting.

With meager resources, OCAP mobilized hundreds to expose the arrogance of politicians who steal our money and hand it over to bankers. OCAP boldly pointed to

the real enemy and using direct action tactics demonstrated the shape and nature of resistance and fight back required on the part of working people to throw back the current severe assault on jobs, education and public services.

#### **bold** action

The capitalist class and their political representatives do not hesitate to take bold and decisive action against us, to shore up their profit-driven system. Without shame or care, they have stolen our homes and jobs and are dismantling our public services. OCAP demonstrated the ability and the need to organize in broad coalitions with direct action to move resistance beyond protest rallies.

Tent cities are cropping up across North America as homelessness escalates. Tuition fees are rising 25-35% to a level no student of a working class family can afford without incurring massive debt. With the real jobless rate at over 20% in the US and 14% in Canada, working people are forced to use credit cards to pay for health care, food and rent. Services for poor people are disappearing, as billions of dollars are injected daily into the wars in Irag and Afghanistan and bankers keep their million dollar bonuses and rewards for economic blunders and crimes.

When I was growing up in rural Ireland my mother worked harder than anybody else in the family. As well as cooking, baking, looking after the children, washing all the clothes by hand, milking cows and feeding calves she made and mended our clothes. She owned nothing and was paid nothing. While there is still a long way to go there has been a big change in many women's position, especially those who are now in the paid workforce.

On a world scale eighty per cent of factory workers are women. This is an important step forward in that it brings hundreds of millions of women together and increases their power. Here in the USA women made up between thirty and thirty five per cent of the paid . . . .

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The real culprits on Bay Street and Wall Street are counting on working people, students and the poor to be divided and confused and to continue to take the blows. They will not stop until we organize from below, in the trade unions and across communities, with the knowledge that the current economic crisis is not an accident or a 'correction in the market' - but a normal feature of the economic system of capitalism.

> For two decades, OCAP has gone on the offensive to organize individuals and communities to fight back. Using direct action case work and public protests they have won back millions of dollars for poor and working people. OCAP uses these victories, strategies and tactics to shout out the real enemy, to point the way forward and shape the mobilizations required to win, and to build an alternative kind of economy and social system that is based on the needs of ordinary working people.

#### challenging the failures of the past

The trade union leadership who promote rallies and "town hall" meetings make only token links with communities. They work to convince workers that we are not ready, not well enough organized, and that we must take "baby steps " to "slowly and gradually" build a movement capable of fighting back and winning.

In sharp contrast, OCAP and their supporters in unions and communities, know that working and poor people, students and immigrants can only learn the extent of their power, the real source of their exploitation and oppression, the real nature of the enemy best, when they join together in struggle, in strikes, on picket lines, to occupy workplaces and spaces of power, visit the homes of the bankers and politicians and disrupt the bosses agenda.

During November 18, 19 and 20th the Trustees of the CSUs and the UC Board of Regents meet to vote on tuition increases of up to 32% and further cuts in classes, staff and faculty. A mobilization has commenced to stop this attack on our education and livelihoods. Students, staff and faculty are calling for strikes and days of action. This is a great step forward! We must continue to push forward by:

**1. Shut Downs.** Shut down the meetings in which the Trustees and Regents are planning to implement further cuts. We cannot allow any talk of reducing our access to education and jobs. Where possible we should shut down schools through strike action. Where strikes take place we should have mass Strike Assemblies to ensure the greatest input by participants. Organize General Assemblies of students and workers at all schools wether there is strike action or not.

2. Spread the Movement. Where shutdowns are consolidated, students should spread the strike beyond our college campuses and into our communities. We must reach out to the other public, city, community and high schools and the students, teachers, workers and families that are being affected by these cuts and the greater economic crisis. We should send speakers to address union meetings to talk up action to union members.

**3. Unity and Organization.** We must unite all existing bodies that are mobilizing into a state-wide organization, with elected representatives from all bodies represented. Strengthen the democratic voice and power of the movement.

Up until now the governing bodies of this country have been successful in isolating workers and students who have not come into struggle and those who have. In Philly workers recently shut down transportation in rejection of a crummy contract, yet the mass media said almost nothing, this is because they fear the unity and mobilization among working class people.





Columbian flower workers have been on strike since September 9<sup>th</sup>. Before the strike, flower workers were constantly exposed to chemicals and women experienced sexual exploitation from male bosses. Benilda farm is currently being occupied by the workers and they are demanding pension and health care benefits. Solidarity is extended by Columbian labor unions.

### **Chinese Teachers**

Teachers at Chengdu Foreign Languages School in China have staged a sit in strike on November 5th & 6th demanding higher wages. They have not received raises since the school has been privatized. In addition, they are demanding an apology from school management for accusing teachers of being part of criminal gang. The strike was well supported by the community, parents and most notably students, who were at the school passing out water bottles to teachers. Yuan Guiren, Education Minister "pledged" to increase teachers pay and allocate school funds more equally.

# **Canadian steel workers**

Unionized Canadian Steelworkers workers in Manitoba Ontario and Newfoundland have been on strike since mid-July. The Brazilian-based mining company, Vale Inc., has insisted that Canadian workers concede wage and benefits. The bosses deny any financial loss from the strike, even though 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter earnings for the company have declined.

Had another dark humor moment in the Union's unemployment line today.

The cloud hovering over union construction is very dark. A recent San Francisco Chronicle article explained that the return to the commercial building boom of the past decade will be years away. In the first 9 months of 2009 residential building permits for the San Francisco region were down 73%! The bailed-out banks aren't lending and the Bay Area construction loan delinquency rate is 17%.

Four thousand of San Francisco's construction union labor force were out of work, a figure that may be near 30%. It's about the same at my local.

So as we stood around this morning at the union hall, we got talking about the state of our nation. One guy was better off than me, he was eligible for the second Federal unemployment benefit extension. We chatted, then another guy chimed in that he didn't even get the first extension and his money ran out months back. We broached the healthcare issue: it cost me two of my four weekly unemployment checks this month to pay for my family's health benefits. But then, the guy with the tooth missing up front, chimed in he was worse off, and as he told his story, he confirmed, he was worse off.

"My health benefits ran out long ago. I am deep, deep in debt. I got a kidney stone. I went to the ER. Shit, by the time I got out two days later, they billed me for \$20,000!"

We all looked at eachother, then he added, "they even charged me \$60 for oxygen - they charged me for the f\*\*\*\*\* air I breathed. Hospital f\*\*\*\*\* air." Then someone yelled, "you should brought your own f\*\*\*\*\* air man." Another dude yelled, "f\*\*\*\*\* \$20,000 for a kidney stone, did they at least give you the stone to take home?" To which our friend quickly replied, "No man! I'll tell 'em I ain't paying till they give me what's mine! And f\*\*\* them, let them try collecting that \$20,000."

After a brief silence a guy sitting across the room piped in, "hey if you ever get that kidney stone dude, put it in a ring, that'll be the most expensive ring you've ever owned!" We all smiled and got up to move down the line.... Capitalist Health Care: it's just precious.
